FROM THE DESK OF ARCHDEACON JOHN

Dear Friends in Christ,

In those days John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judea, proclaiming, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." This is the one of whom the prophet Isaiah spoke when he said, "The voice of one crying in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight."

This is Advent, and this means that John the Baptizer greets us once again. Advent time is John time, as we are not quite ready for the time of Jesus. In this time before we celebrate the Incarnation, we are told to get ready.

Getting ready is supposed to be a time for preparation, deliberation, meditation, and praying on what it means to wait for the one who will prepare the way of the Lord and make his paths straight. However, we also use this time during Advent to be busy planning our social functions or gift buying as we move towards Christmas Day. Understandably, focusing on the latter is more appealing than the image of John crying out in the wilderness. John evokes images of joy, but also the hardship faced by Israel as they wander the wilderness.

As we sit on any given Sunday in our beautiful and sacred worship space, and we busy ourselves with normal Christmas activities, we may be able to suppress the idea of the wildernesses that we may have to face.

However, the idea of being in the wilderness is not unfamiliar to many.

The wilderness is an experience felt by those who are sick, suffering, and feeling spiritually lost. I think of our friends at St. David's as they travel from Sunday to Sunday to the different parishes of Huronia. They are warmly received and welcomed by each parish, making space for them because they are part of our parish as a whole. However, they are in the wilderness as they feel the damage to their church and not being in it at this time of year. Be assured that those in the wilderness are not alone.

In many ways, John was on the margins. John was a creature of the old ways, but John was also pointing to the kingdom to come. In this time of Advent, we are reminded that there is a pathway out of the wilderness. Our faith in Jesus Christ is a reorientation for a new way of life. While we may be in the wilderness personally or as a church community, and there is hardship to be sure, the Holy Spirit has a way to keep nudging us on in the direction of Jesus and the new life and experiences that can bring. For many of us, we spend a lot of time looking back or to the past to inform us about our church experience, and that makes us feel good. And we must celebrate those wonderful experiences. But like John, the experience of those in the wilderness tells us there is comfort each and every Advent as we look forward and wait with expectation for the One to come.

Director of Music Search Committee

As we all know, our Director of Music, Jeff Campbell, will be leaving us at the end of June 2026 to take up a similar position at St. Andrew's, Presbyterian Church. He described to us that this was always his dream, and we want to encourage him to live out his dreams. And while I may continue to poke fun at Jeff, I thank him for all his contributions to music ministry at St. James', but also to the life of our parish.

In 2020, just before COVID, I met with Jeff to tell him that I was going to start to introduce more contemporary liturgy to our Sunday services. I explained that we needed to have a greater diversity of voices and backgrounds, and that we needed to explore Anglicanism from other parts of the communion. I also wanted Jeff to begin the process of introducing more contemporary hymns and anthems, and to bring in more instrumentalists and vocalists. Together, we found interesting and joyful ways to connect more contemporary liturgy with a new music direction. While it may not be for everyone, most of you have told us that you like these changes.

The wardens and I are in the process of forming a Director of Music Search Committee, composed of three to four members of the choir and one or two representatives from the congregation. Leslie Fortune, as a warden and member of the choir, will chair the committee, and I will act in an advisory role as I am canonically responsible for all aspects of worship, including music. I want to be forthcoming with you that I remain committed to a broader and diverse form of worship and music.

It is also important to name a reality that the position will be for a person who can both direct the choir and play the piano and/or organ. In part, this is due to monetary constraints, but it is also because it is becoming harder to find organists. This is true not only for smaller communities like Orillia, but we are seeing it throughout the larger urban settings in the Diocese. Many churches in a similar situation have had to bring in guest organists to complement their music ministry when there is a particular need for an organist's presence.

Throughout all of this, I am confident the Holy Spirit will lead us, and I ask your continued prayers as we begin this process.

December 15 is the deadline for entries.


A DIFFERENT ADVENT CONSPIRACY EVENT FOR 2025

ALBERT GREER MEMORIAL WINDOWS

It was with great excitement that we saw new lighting installed in anticipation of the new memorial windows, and even greater excitement when the windows actually arrived on Friday, November 7th. I hope by now you have had an opportunity to see them for yourself, as they are quite simply stunning. The scene depicts a sunset over Georgian Bay, with various elements of nature which Albert loved...water, rocks, trees, a few loons, and a dove. When contemplating the windows, you are invited to be in that sacred space, breathe deeply, and allow calm to enter your soul. God created this beauty for us to give us strength to face our daily tasks and challenges. The caption quotes, "My Life Goes on in Endless Song; How Can I Keep from Singing", and my wish for you is that you can leave with a song in your heart.

Now, a little back story: I am deeply grateful to Archdeacon John Anderson and the Wardens of St. James' for the opportunity to have these windows created in Albert's memory; I truly believe he would have loved them. It was a privilege to be able to donate the funds from Albert's estate (i.e. the sale of our home) to pay for them, and at first, I selfishly wanted to do it all myself. However, when I spoke of the project to friends, the response was invariably, "I would like to contribute to that". It was then that I realized it would be unfair to deny them that privilege. Therefore, I would rather say thank you to all who so generously gave toward this memorial tribute, and to say that the majority of the funds raised came from outside the St James' church family. Albert was greatly loved and admired by so many people during his lifetime, and friends were happy to commemorate him in this way.

May I also give my deep gratitude to Rosemarie Freeman, who was my co-pilot on this project. Her assistance and support have been invaluable! A "shout out" to Dean Jobin-Bevans as well, for his initial input while he was still with us at St. James'.

Will you help our St. James' Annual Christmas Project?

Did you know? It's been well over 40 years that St. James' ACW has been heading up our Christmas Project. Long ago at its start, we managed gifts for six families through their social workers with an agency in Orillia called "Tamarac" - which later become "Catulpa-Tamarac". The number of families grew and what we provided did, too: from random presents to a "Special Wish Gift" plus extras, plus mittens and hats; from any food we were given to food to prepare a Christmas Dinner plus extras, and the choice of a turkey or ham. Our number of families not only grew to come from more agencies - Couchiching Jubilee House, New Path and Community Living Huronia, as well as Catulpa - but we also added single teens from the Orillia Youth Centre - from perhaps 20 people to over 100! (We used agencies because they know their clients' needs already.) We also have added some people who came directly to St. James' to ask for help...

Then came COVID. Like everyone else, ACW had to "pivot" but we didn't miss a Christmas! Now we provide GIFT CARDS: in November, cards to buy children's presents (\$50 per child); in December, cards to buy Christmas Dinner plus (\$25 per person in the family). It's not as much fun as our "Wrapping Day" used to be, but it's safer for health reasons and it's cost effective because we purchase the gift cards through our St. James' FUNDSCRIP program, which brings in at least a bit of money for St. James' on the side.

WILL YOU HELP US? <u>All through November and especially on ACW Sunday (Nov. 16)</u>, we will be collecting money for our FUNDSCRIP gift card orders for November and December. Simply note that your money is for the "St. James' ACW Christmas Project" and it will get to us - on a Sunday or through the Church Office, Tuesday through Thursday. Any amount will help. THANKS!








St. James' Book Discussion Group

Service Fellowship After having a successful High Tea in September, the ACW was happy to be able to give \$2,500 to the church in November.

Some of our members attended a meeting at St. Athanasius, on October 25th. 13 people were in attendance representing ACW groups from churches in our area. Discussions were around working together for events and hosting an event together with all 8 of the community of churches in the future. Another meeting is set for March 7th, 2026.

We celebrated ACW Sunday on November 16th and were blessed to have Rev. Samuel's wife Opeoluwa Fayomi speak at the 10 a.m. service. Ope spoke about her experiences in Nigeria and moving to Canada, and about answering God's call even when it isn't part of your plan. An honorarium was made to SAFIF, which is a non-profit organization based in Nigeria focused on empowering vulnerable groups. Cake and coffee were served after the service.

The Christmas project is well underway; we will be supporting 80 people, 47 of whom are children, this year. Please consider donating to support the purchase of gift cards for these families.

St. Nick's Day is approaching on Dec 6th, with a visit from St. Nicholas himself. We would appreciate any volunteers to be elves. It is such a delight to assist the children as they shop for their loved ones and see them enjoy the gift of giving this season.






