Dear Friends in Christ,

Lift Up Our Hearts, Lift Up your Thanks, and Lift Up St. James'

On Saturday, September 27th the <u>Lift Up Our Hearts</u> service was held at St. James'. This was a Diocesan service and was the fourth of five services that support the Season of Spiritual Renewal. St. James' was the only parish outside of the GTA that hosted a service, and we had approximately 190 people filling our church. We heard wonderful music, a great sermon was given by The Reverend Rob Hurkmans, and we saw many friends from across the North Archdeaconry and the Diocese of Toronto.

While we were hosting this service, it could not have happened without the support of the St. James' congregation who used their gifts, talents, and time to make this worship service a wonderful gift.

The Fellowship Committee under Christine Blair, Ann Thompson, Fred Blair, and Jeri Stone had the difficult task of providing a wonderful meal for what was a moving number of people. It was described by the organizers as first class! Thank you Fellowship for your untiring devotion to this church.

Getting the hall, parking, and worship space ready for a service of this type takes a lot of work and preparation. It includes reserving parking spots, putting up banners, filling in potholes, moving tables, cleaning, getting the platforms set in the chancel, putting out extra chairs, or making the Upper Room comfortable for the chancel team. This work was done under the careful guidance of Jen Hill. She worked and worked in the days leading up to the service. Thank you to our Loonie Lunch volunteers that helped moved the heavy objects.

There are so many other people to thank, from Sue Glowa organizing the greeters to the Altar Guild. There were so many of you working in the background and you made a difference!

Several of the bishops, clergy, and Diocesan staff members that attended the service, many of whom have not been at St. James' in the past, remarked on two wonderful points. First, what a beautiful church we have, and it is such a wonderful worship space to do a choral service. It reminded them of what is beautiful about Anglican worship. Secondly, and most often heard, is the outstanding choir and music. People were astounded by our choir and the music leadership and organ playing of Jeff Campbell. Your musical gift made all the difference to our service.

One of the remarks made by several of you and from members of the Parishes of Huronia was the joy in coming together in a large service. To come together to hear beautiful music, inspiring preaching, and settling into our Anglican liturgy. If only we can do it more often? Here is the thing; we can do it. I would like to explore and encourage us and our parishes in Huronia to come together for a quarterly service. It does not have to be at St. James' but can rotate amongst our parishes. It can be an Evening Prayer or Eucharist. The important thing is to come together as one Body of Christ.

THE HISTORY OF ORANGE SHIRT DAY

As a Country, Canada has listened to the stories of our young people.

We are all aware of Terry Fox and the story of his Marathon of Hope and the millions of dollars it has continued to raise, even 45 years after Terry's death.

We may be familiar with "Orange Shirt Day", but do we know the story of the young girl who inspired us to wear orange shirts on September 30?

Phyllis Jack Webstad was just six years old when she was shipped off to a Residential School. Before leaving, her grandmother (nookomis) gave her a lovely new orange shirt to wear on the first day of school. However, when Phyllis reached the school, she was stripped of all her clothes, including her brand-new shirt, which was never returned to her.

The loss of the shirt left her feeling worthless and insignificant. This experience is used to represent the broader trauma of Residential Schools,



Orange Shirt Day was first established as an observance in 2013, as part of an effort to promote awareness and education of the Canadian Residential School System and the effect it has had on Indigenous communities for over a century. September 30, the annual date of the event, signifies the time of year when Indigenous children, like little Phyllis, were historically taken from their homes to Residential Schools. The official tagline of the day, "Every Child Matters", symbolizes the belief that every Indigenous child's life is valuable. It is a day to remember the thousands of Indigenous children who died in Residential Schools, many of whom are still unaccounted for. It also raises awareness about the tragic history and ongoing legacy of Residential Schools. It is a call for Reconciliation, encouraging non-Indigenous people to engage in anti-racism and anti-bullying initiatives and to support the process of healing.

Orange Shirt Day at St. James' is celebrated Sunday, Sept. 28, at our services, so dig out your orange shirt in support! Pat Hehn, Social Justice and Outreach Committee




Today, the librarian was jubilant! Upon entering the library, she found a bag containing a dozen books that had been returned. One book in particular had been missing for 5 years.



ORDER OF THE DIOCESE OF TORONTO

The deadline for submitting nominations for the **Order of the Diocese of Toronto (ODT)** is fast approaching. The purpose of the Order is to recognize and honour those members of the laity in the Diocese who have given outstanding service over a significant period of time in their volunteer ministry. This year, every parish in the following deaneries is eligible to submit one nomination: **Huronia and Oshawa**. The nomination form is available on the **Diocese of Toronto** website and can be submitted **until November 17, 2025**. We have put some nomination forms on the bulletin board outside of Stubley Auditorium.



Nominations can be made by any parishioner. They're submitted to the incumbent and churchwardens (and can be left at the church office), who will choose only one nomination to be forwarded to the bishop. (Awards will not be given posthumously.) Please have your nominations in by Friday, November 7, 2025.
